Community of Practice for Nursing

IWK Chemotherapy Order Changes

Hydration order changes:

Rapid prehydration no longer requires a urine specific gravity to proceed with chemotherapy.

The length of post hydration for cisplatin and ifosfamide and for intermediate to high doses of cyclophosphamide has changed to run at least 12 hours after the end of the infusion. For multi-day chemotherapy, the hydration will remain at maintenance rates after the 12-hour hyperhydration until the next day chemotherapy dose is due. This is a change from the previous practice of running hyperhydration for 24 hours after the chemotherapy doses. These changes will be reflected on the individual chemotherapy orders.

Etoposide administration:

Etoposide no longer requires a filter for concentrations less than or equal to 0.4 mg/mL and will now be administered over 2 hours vs 4 hours. A non-PVC bag and tubing are still required.



YACC has so much to offer!

Getting diagnosed with cancer sucks. No question. But when you're dealing with cancer and its impact in your late teens, 20s, or 30s, it hits your life in a totally different way. You have a job, school, kids, a plan—it's a really inconvenient time to deal with a life-changing illness.

YOUNG ADULT CANCER CANADA

Young Adult Cancer Canada (YACC) provides a connection to peers, bridge out of isolation, and source of inspiration. Our web-based and face-toface programs and services help young adults understand why it's different to be diagnosed with cancer before the age of 40, overcome cancer-related challenges, and process their experiences with people who truly get it.

YACC also makes it easy for healthcare providers to <u>refer young adults to us with this online form</u>. Once it is sent, you can be sure we will connect with a welcoming message and all the information needed.

OUR PROGRAMS

YACC Chats provide a confidential and secure way for young adults affected by cancer to connect and support one another. These peer-led virtual conversations are offered over Zoom by a team of trained and compassionate YACC leaders who prioritize creating a safe and supportive environment.

YACC Chats: Series is similar to the regular YACC Chats, but participants sign up and commit to getting together weekly for eight weeks in order to deepen connections and build on the conversation discussing topics relevant to the young adult cancer community. YACC also monitors a **private Facebook group** for over 1,500 young adults dealing with cancer in Canada. The group's members share their trials and triumphs, support each other, and also share a few jokes now and then!

Localife is a fun, local, social activity-based group led by trained YACCers in eight cities across Canada (St. John's, Ottawa, Toronto, Winnipeg, Edmonton, Calgary, Vancouver, and Victoria). It is the program where you can come and connect over hot wings or at a great event where the conversation isn't always about cancer, but it's always welcome to come up.

We also know it takes longer to recover from cancer than to be treated for it. At YACC, recovery is about more than remission, it is about living a life worth loving—hopefully for the long road. That is why YACC launched the **<u>Recover Study</u>**!

Recover is a community-led study where we work together to set the priorities and better understand life and cancer for young adults and how it affects quality of life over time.

The survey is open to people living in Canada who were diagnosed with cancer before the age of 40 and are currently over the age of 18. The information provided will be used to increase awareness and develop programs to address the issues that young adults with cancer feel are most important.
