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Education Day

An education day was held on September 26th for a multi-disciplinary group of about 18. Presentations on current educational material for all disciplines were discussed and how to best adopt/adapt present material into an educational framework for APPHON members.

Each working group: psychosocial, nurses and physicians will be working on how to establish an effective education system for all levels of people involved with pediatric hematology/oncology This system, care. developed in conjunction with Atlantic Provincial Cancer Agencies, when in place, will be available across the Atlantic Provinces as a tool to further education and learning.

Guidelines, Policies & Protocols

As Allan Fotheringham would say it is time to de-muddify the muddification of Policies, Guidelines and Protocols.

First, *protocols* are the specific treatment plan for a disease, for most of our patients it is a COG protocol. It is what you must follow to participate in the research study. *Policies* are specific to each institution. They must be followed as well but are hospital driven, e.g. chemotherapy administration. *Guidelines* are just that ... guidelines which outline what is recognized to be best practice in a certain area. But they are guidelines; unlike policies/protocols they have some flexibility.

There are times when a health care professional may need to work outside the guideline in order to do what is best for their patient. So, policies are mandatory driven by the institution; protocols are mandatory driven by research study parameters; guidelines are more flexible and represent written principles that will guide actions.
